The Theater of the Unconscious

Reference to the theatrical model is very present in psychoanalytic theory and has been since its origins. The transference stages a space of fiction where the analysand unknowingly plays out a written script. The unconscious needs the fictional scene of the transference to enact a desire that pushes for its interpretation. In the analytic act analysands can discover themselves as co-authors of a script they are creating.

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Singular Femininity: The All and the Not-All

Saturday, November 12, 2022 • 10:00 AM – 2:00 PM

In the 1970s, Lacan posited that a phallic logic — an age-old discursive logic supported by the law, which Freud deciphered and largely shared — could not account for femininity in its entirety. Fifty years on, Lacan's innovative logic of the feminine as “not-whole” remains little known or used, despite the obvious fact that social changes in the redistribution of functions between the sexes show them to be strongly at work in today's society. This workshop will explore the relevance of Lacan's logic.

Fanaticism

From 20th-century racist totalitarianism to 21st-century religious fundamentalism, fanaticism has been one of the gravest of our age's social ills; has psychoanalysis paid it adequate attention? Largely through Lacan's theory, we will examine the structural underpinnings of fanatical discourse and the personalities that embrace it. In the process, we will explore the function of the "Cain complex."

As speaking beings, we don't relate to sex through mere anatomy, but through a logic of sexualized identification. Symbolic and real, phallic jouissance and the solitude of a non-symbolizable "Other-sex," are not in contradiction but in interplay, as this presentation of Lacan's quantic formulas will attempt to show.

Ears to Hear

According to the Greek tragedy *Prometheus Bound*, human beings once “had ears but did not understand.” Prometheus then initiated them into a special art of divination, showing them how to catch crucial yet elusive signs in obscure words and calls, grasping truths inaccessible to ordinary perception by a practice of overhearing. This presentation will discuss some ancient customs of grasping omens in chance acts of speech, setting them in relation to the study of slips inaugurated by Freud.

The Capitalist's Discourse

In 1972, three years after defining the forms of the social link through four discourses (those of the master, the hysteric, the university, and the analyst) Lacan, in Milan, proposes a fifth. Should we read the capitalist's discourse as a supplement to, or variant on, the previous four? In fact it raises new questions about the relation between politics and psychoanalysis, the place of psychoanalysts in public life, and possible clinical consequences.

Phobic and Fetish Object

Adriana Passini

The phobic object and the fetish object both fulfill a function articulated as a protection against castration anxiety. In phobia, the object encloses the subject in a frame that shields him from his fears. The fetish object is bound to castration anxiety, being linked to the perception of the absence of the phallic organ and to the negation of this absence, but functions to “complement” what is presented as a hole.

This seminar will examine what constitutes these differences and most specifically the complex structures underlying each of them.

Pursuing our reflections on voluntary servitude, this seminar continues to explore the relations between the subject and the collective and the discourses that organize them. Particular attention will be paid to the function of the One and Lacan's logic of the *pas-tout* (often translated as "the not-all"), as well as to the function of the subject supposed to know in social bonding, in the discourse of science, in that of religion, and in the unfolding of clinical treatment. The way in which contemporary ideologies and identitary claims partake in new forms of segregation will be addressed.

The Unconscious Real and the Numerical Real

In 1973 Lacan distinguished an inaccessible real of the unconscious and a real of number, two forms of real. What relates them? In the same year, he also posed a question regarding logical time: What, in a set of dimensions, "simultaneously produces surface and time"? We will address the limits to deciphering the signifiers in dreams and to censorship, and the limits number creates. The boundary between these two reals depends on the contingency of object *a* in the analytical cure and the end of analysis.

What Ethics for Psychoanalytic Practice Today?

Psychoanalysis has faced resistance since Freud. Currently, it is being questioned by neuroscience and cognitivism. Various psychotherapies are competing with it, including religious ones. Some countries tend to exclude it from state health or educational institutions.

For the last fifty years, there have been many political, social, and technical changes in the neo-capitalist stage we are living through, affecting at the same time the individuals consulting us due to their discomfort and affecting us as psychoanalysts since we are all divided subjects of this scientific civilization.

Lacan proposed a writing of capitalist discourse where the social bond is no longer linked to the impossible. Scientific ideology feeds the illusion that everything is possible and that economic growth can be infinite. There is a push to consumption that has created unpayable debts for individuals, companies, and nations. There is no longer a monetary standard to refer to, and the markets are hyper-inflated in a flight forward that is creating new bubbles. Meanwhile, social inequality and the planet's destruction have reached hard points of return.

Gisèle Chaboudez is a psychiatrist and psychoanalyst practicing in Paris. Formed by Jacques Lacan, she has been a director of medico-psychological centers and taught at Université Paris XIII. She is editor-in-chief of the magazine *Figures de la psychanalyse* and vice-president of Espace Analytique, where she teaches. Her books include *Rapport sexuel et rapport des sexes* (2004), *Ce qui noue le corps au langage* (2019), and *L'équation des rêves* (2019) and in fall 2022 Routledge will publish her in translation with *What Can We Know about Sex? A Lacanian Study about Sex and Gender*.

Lillian Ferrari is a psychoanalyst practicing in NYC. She is a member and faculty member of Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association. She has taught at Washington Square Institute and at PINC (Psychoanalytic Institute of Northern California), and lectured at the Atlanta Psychoanalytic Society. She has written numerous articles on psychoanalysis; her most recent publication appeared in *Sexualidad y los Lazos Sociales* (Letra Viva, 2018).

Gérard Haddad is a psychiatrist and psychoanalyst practicing in Paris. His theoretical work focuses on the study of religion in the light of psychoanalysis. His books include *Les folies millénaristes*, *Le jour où Lacan m'a adopté*, *Freud en Italie*, and, in English translation, *Eating the Book: Dietary Rites and Paternal Function*.

Daniel Heller-Roazen is Arthur W. Marks '19 Professor of Comparative Literature at Princeton University. Most recent books are *Absentees: On Various Missing Persons* (2021) and *No One's Ways: An Essay on Infinite Naming* (2017).

Paula Hochman practices psychoanalysis in Buenos Aires. She is a member of Topologie en Extension, a professor at universities in Argentina and Brazil, and the author of *La función fálica y la castración* (TEE), *Psicoanálisis del narcisismo y el fantasma. Un método en el laberinto* (Ed. Logos Kalós, Buenos Aires 2019), and, in English translation, *The Courage to Read* (TEE/ L. Álvarez, 2021).

André Michels is a psychoanalyst practicing in Luxembourg and Paris, and a member of the Après-Coup faculty. He is the co-editor of the *Jahrbuch für klinische Psychoanalyse*, editor of *Actualité de l'hystérie*, and author of numerous articles on psychoanalysis.

Paola Mieli is a psychoanalyst practicing in New York City. She is the president of Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association (New York), a member of Le Cercle Freudien (Paris), of Espace Analytique (Paris), and of the section of Psychoanalysis in Psychiatry of the World Psychiatry Association (WPA). She is the author of numerous essays on psychoanalysis and on culture.

Ona Nierenberg is a psychoanalyst in NYC, a former senior psychologist and director of HIV Psychological Services at Bellevue Hospital, and clinical instructor in the Department of Psychiatry at NYU Langone Medical Center. She is a member and faculty member of Après-Coup, an Overseas Member of APPI, Dublin, and an Honorary Member of Lacan Toronto.

Adriana Passini practices psychoanalysis in NYC, and is a member and faculty member, Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association.

Mark Stafford is a psychoanalyst in New York, and a member, and Formation Program alumnus, of Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association.
