Is Jouissance a Psychoanalytic Concept?

Advanced Lacanians are supposedly those who have a ‘clinic of the real’ or of ‘jouissance,’ but beyond the sophisticated terms we often find feeble and unhelpful conceptualisations. The label ‘jouissance’ is now used almost entirely descriptively, thus blocking further exploration of a variety of clinical issues and shutting down rather than opening up clinical and conceptual questions about the symptom, the body, repetition, and sexuality.

2020 has been a moment of truth for analysts, too. The pandemic and State health regulations related to it had an impact on the practice of psychoanalysis, unveiling confusions and misunderstandings on the part of the analysts themselves. 'Before' the birth of the speaking being is the being without speech, the *infans*, a figure helplessly dependent on an other, in relation to which it struggles to orient itself. Thanks to an utterly unforeseeable eventuality, the human animal becomes possessed by a speech that, no longer aimed primarily at communication, introduces into the domain of human being an invocatory dimension, inexplicably transfiguring in the process the sensory apparatus and vital body.

Inspired by Alain Didier-Weill, whose writing creatively evokes what is at stake in our transformation into beings inhabited by speech, readings will include chapters from his *The Three Times of the Law*, as well as work by Freud (especially the *Project*) and Lacan, S. Lillian Ferrari practices psychoanalysis in New York. She is a member and faculty member of Après-Coup Psychoanalytic Association and an instructor at Washington Square Institute.

Betty Fuks practices psychoanalysis in Rio de Janeiro. She holds a PhD in Communication and Culture, is Professor in the postgraduate course in Psychoanalysis, Health and Society at Veiga de Almeida University (Brazil) and is the author, among other books, of *Freud and Jewishness: the Vocation of Exile*.

Salvatore F. Guido is a practicing psychoanalyst in New York City.
